As we begin this long season of Pentecost, I ponder on what this means. Pentecost is the time of the church where we not only celebrate the presence and gift of the Holy Spirit, but we lift up the many ways that the Holy Spirit guides and leads us in our daily lives. I think we begin by asking ourselves, what do we see the Holy Spirit as and where do we see the Holy Spirit? I think it is in the connections we have with each other. It is the bonds we share with our friends, our neighbors, even those whom we meet on the street in the midst of our daily interactions. **PILGRIM'S CORE VALUES:
SPIRITUALITY & PRAYER**

Many years ago, I went with a group from Pilgrim for a workshop at Saint Anthony's Spirituality Center in Marathon City and was very impressed and wanted to come back and stay for a while. Saint Anthony's Friary started 101 years ago as a house of studies for the Capuchins who follow Saint Francis of Assisi. In 1971 the school was relocated, and Saint Anthony's was turned into a retreat center.

A friend of mine encouraged me to sign up for a retreat and one of the first ones that I attended was a week-long retreat led by Sister Jose Hobday. She was a Native American Franciscan Sister and stressed simple living as a path to joy and freedom. "Simple living is not about elegant frugality. It is not really about deprivation of whatever is useful and helpful for our life. It is not about harsh rules and stringent regulations. To live simply, one has to consider all of these and they may be included to some degree, but simple living is about freedom. It's about a

Music, the Comfort Food for our Souls During Dark Times.
"Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God."

Isaiah 40:1

Recently, at a meeting of the Pilgrim worship team, each person present shared their favorite Bible verses of comfort. Vicar Will's was the one at the top of this column. "Comfort, O comfort my people".

When I looked into this verse more deeply, I learned it comes from a time amazingly similar to our current times. The Israelites were facing a struggle—they were about to go into exile. They were afraid that God had abandoned them.

We are in the midst of a crisis that goes by the name of COVID-19. It has separated us from loved ones and for many people separated them from their jobs. People are living in a kind of modern exile and as a society we are afraid. No doubt some people wonder if God has abandoned us.

In Isaiah the promise is clearly stated—even though times are hard, God has not, and will not, abandon his people.

While we know God's promise and want to believe it is true, people are still afraid. This is where music comes in for many people. **It seems to me music has been comfort food for people's souls during this scary, unknown time.**

I did a very small survey, asking some Pilgrims and some very good friends of Pilgrim what their favorite kind of music is. One philosophical person said she knows her favorite music when she hears it but she doesn't have a storage place in her brain dedicated to "favorites." The variety of music people identified as their favorites is heartwarming. It includes barbershop, classic pop and rock, easy listening with a special nod to James Taylor and Josh Groban, ballads, classical, gospel, country, 80s dance music, polkas, the harmonies in singing from the traditional music of Hawaii and the other South Sea islands, songs from musicals, and operatic songs especially if they are sung by Andrea Bocelli. The person who loves to hear Andrea Bocelli sing remembers exactly where she was and what she was doing when she first heard him more than 30 years ago. I think it was love at first sound. We even have a person within our group who used to be a nightclub DJ!

I suspect the reasons behind what makes a kind of music a favorite is as varied as the kinds of music people love. What is your favorite kind of comfort food music? What makes it your favorite?

With thanks for music, an amazing gift of God! With thanks for the diversity in music that means there can be a favorite kind for almost everyone!

THE WAY FORWARD

In the era of COVID-19 our lives have been changed, at least in the short-term. So has the Church as we know it. Who would have thought that just a few short months ago that the country would virtually shut down and with it, our place of worship?

If you have kept up on the new developments, you know that President Trump recently declared Churches “Essential.” You also heard from the expert on infectious diseases, Dr. Birx that the latest scientific information is that COVID-19 is not easily spread on surfaces. You also know that the Wisconsin Supreme Court struck down the extension Governor Evers’ “Stay at Home” orders. You have seen local sit-down restaurants beginning to reopen. Even Kohl’s is opening. Some churches of other denominations have begun to open. And, of course, you have been able to shop at big box stores, the grocery store and even Menard’s and Home Depot all along.

So what about opening the Church for in-person worship services? What about resuming all of the activities that go on at the church?

At our May Church Council meeting, the council began a discussion about reopening in light of the then possible Supreme Court decision. At the same time, the ELCA and our Synod issued a number of guidance documents and held video conferences with health experts and pastors. After consideration of the information available, the council opted to continue to observe the guidance provided by the Synod, the State’s “Badger Bounce Back” guidance and the guidance from the CDC at least for the next few weeks.

The council will hold a special meeting in early June to further discuss plans for reopening. Worship services will look a little different than they did before the onset of COVID-19. Some of our usual activities will be curtailed in an abundance of caution. The health and well-being of the congregation is a priority. Our goal is to see you in person soon and safely. We will keep you informed as we move forward.

In the meantime, pray that God provide guidance to the Council and all leaders. Continue to worship at home, tuning into the digital-recorded services online. Share God Moments with each other. Be there for each other. Call someone in the congregation to say hello and catch up. The church office is open. If you need the service of the Vicar or Fred don’t hesitate to reach out. MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: (Jean Trempe) Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Jean Trempe had devotions.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Jean Trempe) Trempe discussed with council future plans for resuming committee meetings, bible studies, rented portions of facilities, worship, offices, community garden and other activities that are held at Pilgrim. Jean will have Fred follow up with Church Mutual the churches liability if someone contracts Covid 19 on the church property. A sign will be put up by the community gardens reminding the gardeners of social distancing. The ELCA is providing excellent information for the churches on Covid 19.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (vacancy no report)

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg) The Checking Account Register, Statement of Financial Position, and Statement of Activities with Budget Comparison were reviewed. Motion by Koerten to accept the Treasurer's report, second by Gottschalk. Motion carried.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Shirley Ecker) Minutes were

reviewed. Motion by Viegut, second by Wunsch to accept the minutes of the April meeting. Motion carried.

VICAR'S REPORT: (Vicar Will Ostrem) Over the course of this last month, my focus has been in the conversations with the synod and ministry partners concerning the impact of Covid 19 within our church settings. How we are coping and dealing with it in our congregations and what preventive measures have we done already and are exploring in the coming projected 18-24 months: **a)** I have shared with you a video with Kerri Parker, who is the Executive Director of the Wisconsin Council of Churches. I do have notes that can be shared from this meeting as well, many of them pertain to Worship and the sanctuary setting, **b)** I had a Zoom meeting with many youth leaders/clergy/ and Sharon Cook from Crossways Camping Ministry as Sharon brought us up to speed on the present and future of Camping Ministry. We have recently had the deaths of Diane Bartell and Jeanette Suehring. Due to Covid 19, both families have attended to funeral arrangements in a close and private manner. There may be an opportunity at a later time to have a celebration of life service. In working with the confirmation and older youth: **a)** it has been decided to suspend confirmation classes until this fall when we can hopefully begin to meet again. There will be two confirmation classes. One for the upcoming confirmands that will meet September – October and Affirmation of Baptism will happen on October 25, 2020. While the other class will be for the rest of the students following the normal schedule, **b)** We will be lifting up our High

School graduates in prayer and blessings on June 7th. Continuing to follow-up with our members through phone to address any Pastoral needs they are facing at this time.

WORSHIP MISSION TEAM: (Sue Koerten) Koerten reported the Worship committee continues to provide worship services each week via the Pilgrim website. Delores continues to coordinate soloists, readers and children's sermon leaders. Fred works on integrating different parts to complete each service. This is all done to maintain social distancing. Comments have been very positive, from the prelude and sending music, to the sermon, children's message, readings and solos, which all help to create a complete service to our viewers. In going forward, we may want to consider this format as an outreach to our homebound, as well as, to the community.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS TEAM: (Eugene Viegut) Viegut reported the outside spring cleaning is done, the lawn mowing crew is all set up, and two new shrubbery were planted on the East Side of steps on the North Church entrance.
