Make a joyful noise!

“There is something deeply human about making art and making music... I love music. I need music in my life.”

In the September issue of the *Progress*, I interviewed Vicar Pat about what music means to him. For this issue, I am grateful to have been able to interview Sarah, Pat’s wife, to ask her about what music means for her. It is fair to say music has a profound impact on her life.

Sarah stated that music is a “joy for me, it gives me an outlet for creativity, it is also a healing, therapeutic outlet.” Sarah and I have shared some similar benefits of music. Long before I understood emotions such as sadness or anxiety, if I was feeling down when I started playing the piano, I would start playing soft, slow music and as I played I started to feel better. As I felt better, my playing became more energized and colorful. Sarah has found similar experiences in her life. Music has the power to lift sad moods.

Sarah sang soprano in choirs while she was in high school. Since then she hasn’t sung in any choirs or played any instruments, but music continues to have a huge influence in her life. If she had the chance, the family of instruments she would most love to learn is percussion; she’d like to have her own drum set. One of the things that draws her to percussion is its portability; in a pinch almost anything can become a percussion instrument. In the meantime, she and Vicar Pat are learning some stringed instruments together, notably the ukulele.

As Sarah thought about where her attachment to music comes from, she immediately talked about sitting on the counter in her parents’ house when she was very young, having her mother, who she describes as an excellent singer, teach her some of the basics of singing, such as how to match sounds with another person. Her early experiences learning how to sing started with her loving relationship with her mother. As she grew Sarah stated she was constantly singing around her family’s home.

In addition to the personal benefits Sarah gains from music, music offers her opportunities for connecting with others. In doing ministry with people, she has found that people often aren’t able to put into words what their faith means to them but they *are* often able to name a hymn that represents what their faith means to them. When people are struggling but unable to put their struggles into words, Sarah has found it helpful to ask them, “What is a song you need to hear right now?” That question often is the starter for a very productive conversation that ultimately can help people handle their struggles or at least understand them.

Sarah enjoys listening to rock, indie rock, folk music, and folk style music.

As Vicar Pat and Sarah are with us at Pilgrim, it will be very interesting to learn more about different ways to use music in ministry.

MINUTES
REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
September 14, 2021
(Unapproved)

PRESENT IN PERSON: President Jean Trempe, Vice President Shirley Ecker, Secretary Jenni Zaitz, Treasurer Charlie Freiberg, Jeanne Wunsch, Eugene Viegut, Charlene Buttner, Janet Williams and Vicar Patrick Kempf.

EXCUSED: Sue Koerten

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER: Jean Trempe called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and Shirley Ecker had devotions.

VICARS REPORT: (Vicar Patrick Kempf) So far things are going well. Vicar Pat has fallen into his groove and feels welcome and supported. He has attended most committee meetings and likes to be a part of what he can. Last week the first confirmation class of the year was held. It had been planned to be at Pilgrim but was instead held at Immanuel Lutheran since they have more up to date technology. He has been busy working with Fred to format a bulletin to be used for the Thursday evening services.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: (Jean Trempe) It is time for Fred's Disability and Survivor Benefit Plan enrollment for 2022. A motion was made by Freiberg, second by Wunsch to continue the plan for 2022. Motion carried. For Fred's Health Insurance the Gold Plan was again approved, he covers the entire cost of the Health Insurance. Fred has submitted a proposal to change his work Schedule. During the summer months he does not work on Fridays. He proposed having the office remain closed on Fridays and he would come in on Sundays to Zoom, record and upload the worship service video's. Although Chris and Jeff sometimes come in to Zoom and record the Sunday services, Fred also comes in to record. Plus whether he records or not he still comes in every Sunday to upload recordings after the worship service is over. This requires up-

loading to Youtube, adding a cover picture, modifying Pilgrim's website and sending out an e-mail message. He had not been charging for the time spent at Pilgrim on Sunday mornings. This change will give him a week-end (two days off) with a couple hours work on Sunday mornings, instead of having Saturday and Sunday off and working half a day on Friday. In the summer he used accrued vacation/sick time to take Friday mornings off. That will stop. Church office hours will now be Mon-Thurs, 8-12 and 1-3. Vicar Pat works on Fridays, so the church building will be open but not the office. A motion to accept Fred's proposal with great thanks was made by Buttner, second by Freiberg. Motion carried. Thank you to Fred for submitting a grant application to the Synod for \$400 to be used toward replacing equipment that Fred borrowed to Pilgrim. There is a congregational match requirement. Mary Tucek's family has purchased and donated an inscribed memorial bench for placement in the garden. They have selected a four foot long composite bench design. In, addition there is \$800 in memorial funds that they would like to dedicate to something special, not toward operating costs. They said that the council could decide what that money would be used for. Some possibilities include new picnic tables, artificial Christmas Trees for in the sanctuary and support of youth going to the youth gathering next summer. Jean is still having conversations with St. Stephen's Council President: St. Stephen's is having a Congregational meeting on October 10, conducted by Associate Bishop Asher O'Callaghan. The purpose is to discern future direction for their congregation and Pastoral leadership. A joint council meeting is on hold for now, dependent on the outcome of their meeting. The following council positions are still vacant: Children and Youth, Stewardship, and Homme Home Representative. Other council positions that will need to be filled for 2022 are President (Jean is completing her second term) and Vice President (Shirley is completing her first three-year term). We may want to make

changes to our council positions. We will have a separate meeting to look at our current bi-laws and find out what other churches are doing. We need to start budgeting for 2022 and form thoughts on what we would like to accomplish and what resources will be needed. Progress Articles are due September 23, 2021.

VICE PRESIDENTS REPORT: (Shirley Ecker) Lay school will be free this year. Google Meet will be used to start the courses. The Memorial Garden will be cut down for the season. It is being considered to have someone till up part of the garden so that the plants and roots can be removed and grass can be planted. Greater Wisconsin Christian Services has asked to meet at Pilgrim the third Tuesday of very month. Motion by Buttner, Second by Viegut to allow them to use Pilgrim for their meeting. Motion Carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: (Charlie Freiberg): The Income and Expense Statement, Accounts Payable, Check Register and Balance Sheet were all reviewed. We are on par with last year. Hopefully, we will start to see more people back in church. Motion to accept the treasurers report by Ecker, Second by Wunsch. Motion carried.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: (Jenni Zaitz) Minutes were reviewed from the August 10th Regular Council Meeting. Motion to accept the minutes by Buttner, Second by Wunsch. Motion carried. Minutes from the special meeting held on August 18, 2021 concerning Covid-19 recommendations were approved. Motion to accept the minutes by Wunsch, second by Viegut. Motion carried.

COMBINED WORSHIP TEAM & COVID RESPONSE TASK FORCE: (Jeff Kessel) The combined COVID Response Task Force and Worship Team met on September 13, 2021. There has been a dramatic increase in COVID-19 cases in Marathon County since early July. The week of 7/10 Marathon County had 4 new cases of COVID-19. There has

been an increase each week to the point that the week of 8/27 there were 255 new cases reported. The COVID related safety guidelines that have been in place since mid August were reviewed. There has been very good compliance with the guidelines. The bulk of the meeting was spent discussing a funeral policy and procedure. Funerals were discussed back in November of 2020 and a draft of a policy & procedure was tabled at that time. A draft of a Funeral Policy & Procedure was presented. It addresses policy for visitations, funeral services, and meals following funeral services. Here are the major discussion points:

- With regards to our face mask recommendations and requirements there was conversation whether funeral home staff should state these at visitation or if it should be handled by signage just inside the church doors.
- We discussed our policy to physically distance as it relates to placement of photo boards, flowers and the casket.
- We noted that funeral home staffs have a lot of experience dealing with COVID issues and they will be asked to do a lot of funerals here.
- We discussed the role of the family of the deceased in funerals. They will be responsible for assuring that people follow some parts of our policy.
- We are aware of the fact that oftentimes many family members of the deceased attend the funeral and will want to sit together. The policy that we propose allows family to sit together in the front pews during the service.
- Physical distancing will be maintained for those outside of the deceased's family who attend the visitation, service and meal.

A motion was made by Delores and seconded by Sue to recommend a comprehensive policy and procedure

to the council. No vote was taken at the meeting because the motion is long and detailed. Therefore, it was decided to incorporate points of the motion into a new document. The new document will be attached to an e-mail to the council. It has already been sent out to task force and worship team members for them to review. Each member has been asked to report their vote to Fred. He will report the vote tally to the council. The proposed Policy and Procedure on Funerals document was reviewed by the council and it was determined that there is a lot of repetition and some of the wording should be revised. Motion by Viegut, second by Ecker to return the document to the Task Force for revisions. Motion Carried.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE: Purchasing a second microphone to upgrade the sound quality was requested. This request was tabled since it was discussed last month and turned down. Any committee or individuals interested in decorating the sanctuary and lounge with fall colors, gourds, pumpkins, etc.. please contact Sue Koerten. The Worship committee would like to resume volunteer readers and Children's Sermons during the Sunday morning services. Reformation Sunday is October 31st. Confirmation started Wednesday, September 8th and we have two students. Discussion on how to acknowledge these students and their families. Also, discussion on starting the mentoring program again. Dates of confirmation will be set early next year for either May or October 2022. Wreath and Rope sales will be held October 10-November 14th. Money earned will be used for the Youth Gathering or for youth activities. More information will be in the October newsletter. All Saints Sunday will be November 7th and votive candles will be available to light to remember loved ones. We had two deaths, Mary Tucek and Mary Henderson and no baptisms. Tuesday, November 23rd will be the Thanksgiving worship service. It still needs to be discussed and decided if there will be a meal or a food collection to be brought to the service. Thursday, December 2nd will be a Day of Prayer, the sanctuary will be open

for prayer to start the Advent season.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH: No Report.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS TEAM: (Eugene Viegut) No one has contacted Eugene concerning the floor in the Fellowship Hall. Carpet squares were recommended by there is concern about having food in a carpeted area and the voting machines. We will soon be looking for a new riding lawn mower. The current mower has been fixed many times and is no longer able to be repaired.

EVANGELISM: The committee has decided to not hold Trunk or Treat this year due to the rise in COVID cases.

BLESSINGS THAT GIVE HOPE: Thank you to those that donated to Blessings that Give Hope during our August Benevolence month. We are still looking for some volunteers to assist with packing bags. The sign up sheet is posted in the narthex. If you would like to help pack but have never packed before, please let one of the committee members know and we would be happy to show you the ropes. We are currently packing for 50 kids.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY MISSION TEAM: (Charlene Buttner) 41 school kits for Lutheran Wold Relief have been completed so far. We are continuing to collect more items. Notebooks are the most needed item right now and very hard to find. 23 quilts and blankets have been donated to be given to Afghan refugees in Wisconsin. This committee will be hosting a coffee hour on Quilt Sunday.

ADJOURN: A motion was made at 8:45 by Wunsch to adjourn the meeting, Second by Freiberg. Motion carried. The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer. The next meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, October 12, 2021 and Jenni Zaitz has devotions.

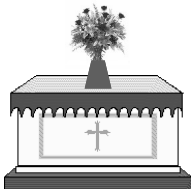
